GEORGE ERDENBERGER HONORED AS MENUCHA'S VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

The Gresham Area Chamber of Commerce honored thirty-six community volunteers at its annual Golden Note awards luncheon on Tuesday, January 30th. Our own George Erdenberger was one of those celebrated.

George began working with the Menucha staff in 2002 to develop a landscape assessment and management plan. He brings a passion for large estates that he developed growing up and exploring New York's Hudson River Valley's numerous large well-known country estates. A degree in Landscape Architecture from the

University of Florida's College of Architecture and Fine Arts began a career of over 40 years in land use and urban planning for architecture/engineering firms and city/county planning agencies (e.g. Multnomah County) and large scale multiple use site planning and detailed landscape design.

George's parallel career in building construction began during the Vietnam era as a builder in the US Navy Construction Battalions (Seabees). He continued as a Construction Project Manager with large development companies building office and industrial parks, shopping centers and mixed residential communities which included golf courses, playgrounds, lakes, model homes and clubhouses.

For the past 25 years George has been involved in private practice. A sample of the variety of projects include garden designs and construction, land use permit preparation, sustainable and energy efficiency buildings, plans for grounds maintenance and site management, and planning and landscape design for a large institution with facilities in several states. In addition, George is a developer and designer of Portland in-fill housing in association with a long term contractor-developer friend. Projects range from single family cluster housing, small/narrow lot house designs and construction, live/work townhouse units and residential over commercial development.

Volunteer work on estate restoration has involved coordination of volunteer work efforts, site design, and construction/renovation of buildings and site features (waterfalls, ponds, utilities, historic building restoration, etc.) Examples of local public involvement include: several years as co-chairman of the Columbia River Gorge Scenic Area Bi-State Economic Development Advisory Board, an advisory board member for a private school, participant in public testimony on land use and park master planning, Key Contact reviewer during development of the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area management plan, and participant in management plan and future envisioning for the C.R.G.N.S.A.

George's wife of 36 years, Georgia, is principal/owner of the Portland architectural interiors firm of Czopek and Erdenberger. They live in the Gorge in Bridal Veil with their alpacas and golden retrievers. Their daughter Kerry is also an interior designer and a producer/director/actress in her theater company, Fuse Theater Ensemble.

IT'S NOT ALL BAD - Spencer Parks, Executive Director

I have never considered myself a Pollyanna sort of person. Neither have I been the pessimist. For me the glass is neither half empty nor half full. It is just a half a glass of water. But as our nation sinks deeper and deeper into this economic morass, I am more and more convinced that it is important to hear about the positive things that are occurring. This is not meant to lessen or denigrate the plight of those who have lost their jobs, homes or means to support themselves. I am aware that for many people, there is very little for which to be thankful or even for which to be positive. However, with so much doom and gloom in the air, I think it is time for us to focus on something else, lest we allow the economic crisis to spread to a crisis of the spirit and the heart as well.



My father, a child of the great depression, told many stories to us as we grew up. Some were stories of poverty, but most were stories of family and community and how the struggles of the time drew them closer together. I have found this to be true for me and my extended family here at Menucha. With financial resources dwindling, we have had to refocus some dreams, but, in so doing, some unexpected things have come sharply into focus. I appreciate those around me more now than ever. I especially appreciate the staff that works with me at Menucha for their uplifting spirit, their unflinching generosity of time, and their willingness to reach out to all those who come through our gates. It is true that we will work with less, but it is also true that, because of that, we will give more. Everyone seems to have adopted the positive attitude of: "We're all in this together so we might as well weather it well." What is more heartening is that I have felt this sense of camaraderie spread to the guests we serve as well.

Another positive outcome is that we have become more creative. We have had to rethink old ways of doing things and address old habits that were unproductive. It has been a delightful (and I really do mean delightful) challenge to reassess what we do and how we do it. Ultimately, when times are less challenging, we will be even more fit to carry out our mission and able to do even more with the resources at our disposal. I am aware that this process can be painful at times, but, as the old saying goes: That which doesn't kill you makes you stronger. I am sure that we will emerge much stronger than before.

And last, but certainly not the end of my list, we have been presented new opportunities to address and expand our mission. When it seems that the world is spinning out of control and all is chaotic; when times are depressing and hope is bleak; when you are truly at your wits end—that is when what we do at Menucha makes the most difference.



This sacred space is a respite of peace and tranquility, a port of calm where you can come and focus on the truly important things in life. Menucha is a place where you can regroup and re-gather. It is a place where you can come and discover, or rediscover, the many uplifting and fulfilling experiences available to you. THE COOKTOP . . . A FAVORITE RECIPE FROM THE MENUCHA KITCHEN

WHITE CHOCOLATE AND CRAISIN SCONES Makes 16

| | |
|----------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 3 cups flour | 1 egg |
| ¾ teaspoon baking soda | ¾ cup buttermilk |
| 1 tablespoon baking powder | ¾ teaspoon vanilla |
| ½ cup sugar | ¾ cup raisins |
| 1 cup butter, cold | 1 cup white chocolate chips |



Combine flour, soda, baking powder and sugar in a mixing bowl; blend together. Cube cold butter and blend into the mixture until it becomes small crumbs. Mix together the egg, buttermilk and vanilla; add to the butter/flour mixture. Mix just until blended. Add the raisins and white chocolate chips. Mix just until well blended. **DON'T OVERMIX!**

Divide dough in half. Form into two 9-inch circles. Cut each circle into 8 pie-shaped wedges, and place on parchment-covered baking sheets. Bake at 350° for 12-15 minutes, or until light brown.

THE WINTER OF 2008!



Wind gusts of nearly 90 miles per hour, with sustained easterly winds of 70+ mph for three days...ten foot snowdrifts in front of Wright Hall...many branches down along the entrance road and around the entire property... thirty trees blown down or uprooted.
