#### WHY I LIKE TO WORK HERE

My drive to work isn't a long drive. It's less than a quarter mile so there are times when the drive to my office turns into a walk to work. Either way, the moment I lock my front door my mind races ahead. I begin thinking about the tasks I've planned for the day, the people I need to contact, and all the other administrative stuff that goes along with being the director of Menucha.

I really enjoy my work so it's very easy to get caught up in the day's events even before I reach the office. It's so easy that I often don't remember driving down the entrance or walking down the exit. But, every once in a while something out of the ordinary will happen; a deer will be on the side of the road, I'll see an unusual flower, and then I'm shaken out of my reverie and I'm acutely aware that I'm entering Menucha. I like it when that happens. It not only reminds me that I need to pay attention to my surroundings, but it also reminds me how beautiful it is here.

It is easy to get caught up in the day to day stuff and become unmindful of what is around you. So I think it's good to be shaken up and reminded of the basics from time to time. I've had a lot of those moments recently. We decided to put together a video to show at our annual fundraising dinner. It was a chance to tell people about Menucha through the eyes of those who come here. I spent about four months interviewing people for this video. I collected almost three hours

of wonderful stories, memories, and experiences. Simply put, it was amazing!

I didn't have to twist arms to get people to step forward to tell their stories. One after another was told of how special and spiritual a place Menucha is for people, of how they often sense something greater than themselves while they are here. People told me about life changing events that have happened here, of how they returned home profoundly affected by their experiences here. There were stories of healing, hope, joy, connectedness that would make your heart ache. At times, I found myself moved to tears as I hid behind the camera.

I've shared that video with the staff. It was affirming for us all to hear those stories and to see firsthand what Menucha means to people.



It was nice to see some concrete results for our work. Most of us don't see what we do here as just a job. We view it as a sort of ministry, a service to others. That's because most of us truly do love people and have, as part of who we are, a real desire to help and serve others. Menucha is a good place to work if you want to do that.

position at Menucha became available, Becky jumped at the opportunity to apply.


Becky lives in Troutdale with her husband Jason and has a daughter Cherie in college. Becky enjoys hiking, reading, walking her dogs, and all things related to food.

## THE COOKTOP . . . A Favorite Recipe from the Menucha Kitchen. Enjoy!

## CARROT SOUP WITH ORANGE AND TARRAGON—makes six 8-oz servings This recipe was served at our annual fundraising dinner to rave reviews!

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 pound carrots, small dice
- 4 ounces onions, small dice
- 5 cups vegetable (or chicken) stock
- 4 ounces potatoes, peeled, small dice
- ½ cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons tarragon, fresh chopped
- Salt and pepper to taste



Add the stock and potatoes. Bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer until the vegetables are tender.

Puree the soup, using an immersion blender, food mill, food processor or blender. Return the soup to the pot and bring back to a simmer.

Add the orange juice and more stock if needed to thin the soup. Add the fresh tarragon and salt and pepper to taste.

**APRIL 18-20: SPRING RETREAT FOR WOMEN WITH CANCER** Susan Hedlund, Director of Washington County Hospice and Palliative Care will be

facilitating this event, a deeply meaningful retreat for reflection and for drawing strength together for the journey ahead.

MAY 3-7: WAY-POINTS PROGRAM WILDFLOWERS AND WATERWALLS Participants will hike and explore some of the nearby trails and waterfalls along the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area, seeking out the hidden wildflower treasures of this pristine area of natural beauty.

In addition, we'll visit intact sections of the original highway and tour the vineyard and fruit orchard country along the way.

**JULY 3-5: WAY-POINTS PROGRAM - FOURTH OF JULY FROLIC FOR FAMILIES** A sure and safe way to spend the holiday weekend with your family! Participants will engage in traditional crafts and community building games, join in on the Corbett Fourth of July Fun Festival on a Menucha float, and view a truly unique fireworks display on the night of the Fourth.


