HAPPY 60th ANNIVERSARY TO US!

We are excited to be celebrating sixty years of ministry at Menucha this year. Sixty years! In honor of this milestone, we have a big goal: to put a new roof on historic Wright Hall, built in 1927 by former Oregon Governor Julius Meier as a summer estate home for his family. This project will cost about \$150,000 and will include rebuilding the chimneys as well.



The year was 1950. Dr. Paul Wright was the Pastor of First Presbyterian Church in downtown Portland. In his words:

"...let's call it divine providence—a real estate man dropped in here (to First Presbyterian Church); I think his firm was in Seattle. And he had a place he said he thought might be useful for purposes of the church, and wanted us to look at it. It was a place out on the Columbia River, overlooking the river, that once had been an all-year-round home of Governor Julius Meier. When we saw it...it looked very attractive. A group of us in the church felt as if we ought to give it serious consideration, and we were entranced the moment we saw it."

On April 21, 1950 Dr. Wright wrote a letter to his congregation:

"Hindsight has its advantage, and that is probably why it has been given good rating. Time tests values and blows the wind that winnows wheat from chaff. It points things up with clarity and in perspective. It is safe and sound. But hindsight never made one inch of gain upon the future. For that, *foresight* is needed; and foresight is a concentration of vision, hope, daring, will and action. Hindsight is intended to serve foresight, not substitute for it. I hope that we, who are the present generation, gaining wisdom and inspiration from the achievements of our forebears, will anticipate the future of our church with eagerness and imagination. I refer to the great opportunity which now insists upon our careful consideration—the purchase of the Julius Meier estate, a facility incredibly ideal for religious retreats and conferences. Generations yet to come will thank us for acting now without hesitation and competently. Loyally yours, Paul S. Wright."

Menucha was bought by First Presbyterian Church with the vision that it would be a place for people to get away from their daily routine to be refreshed and renewed. It was as true in 1950 as it is in 2010.

During our 50th anniversary celebration in 2000, we prayed a prayer of Thanksgiving for Menucha:

*Dear God,
We come to you with thanks for the ministry of First Presbyterian Church at Menucha.
For the vision that imagined a place where people could go to a beautiful place apart from their everyday life to be renewed and refreshed.
For the people who have come to Menucha.
Those who have been touched by your Spirit and have sensed the wonder of your creation.
Those who have experienced healing and forgiveness, those who have grown to be more whole as persons.
We ask you to continue to bless this ministry with the wisdom, energy and love needed to meet the changing needs and situations in the world, and the unchanging needs for renewal, grace, forgiveness and love.*

Menucha. Still waters. Sacred space for purposeful work. We hope you will take the opportunity to visit us during this year of celebration and see how you can be a part of our exciting program. Let's "Raise the Roof" together in 2010!



CELEBRATING 60 YEARS OF MINISTRY Rev. Spencer Parks—Executive Director



In 1950 Harry S. Truman was President and the Korean War was just beginning. The credit card was introduced, the first organ transplant was performed, Charles Schulz debuted his classic comic strip *Peanuts*, and Menucha was purchased by First Presbyterian Church in Portland from the Julius Meier estate. The Senior Pastor at the church was the Rev. Doctor Paul S. Wright. (We named Wright Hall after him.) When he was approached with the opportunity for the church to buy the property, he became an enthusiastic supporter of the endeavor. However, such support was not shared by the entire congregation. It seems that it was quite a controversial issue. A number of people pointed out that there were already enough country clubs and they didn't need one more (church owned at that) on the river front in the Columbia River Gorge.

Wright had a different vision. In an interview in 1989 recalling those early days Wright stated, "We decided that whatever uses were made of it (Menucha), it had to center in on the enrichment of human life. It could be social service agencies, educational groups, anyone interested in the enrichment of life would be able to come there....We felt it was sort of a mission which we (the church) were undertaking on behalf of the enrichment of the entire community."

A lot has happened since 1950. The world has changed more radically than any of us could have imagined at the time. There are issues now that weren't even on the horizon then. We are much more the global community than we ever were. The ways in which we communicate with one another have exploded. The advances in technology have affected every facet of our lives and of our society. And yet, many things remain the same.

People still need to form strong social and personal connections. People still need to find an outlet for their creativity, and answers to their problems. People still need to feel human, spiritual, grounded and enriched. This means that the vision with which Menucha was founded 60 years ago is as important and valid today as it was then — perhaps even more so. With all our advances in technology and our progressive ways of thinking and acting have come new ways to make people feel small and unimportant, disconnected, and enslaved. In other words, we need human enrichment now more than ever.

We feel that throughout the past 60 years we have remained faithful to our mission. We have hosted countless people trying to address a variety of addictions. We have had an army of artists parade through our gates seeking a place of inspiration for their work. We have had innumerable people who have been spiritually uplifted, formed or deepened personal relationships, experienced emotional healing. The list goes on and on, but the common theme is always one of "the enrichment of human life." I think Dr. Wright would have been proud of what we have been and what we are today.

Sixty years is a pretty huge milestone for a place like Menucha. We look forward to the years to come and pledge that we will continue to be that place that enriches human life.

THE COOKTOP

A Favorite Recipe from the Menucha Kitchen—Enjoy!

RANGER COOKIES — makes 50 large cookies

1 cup butter	1 ¾ teaspoon baking soda
1 cup shortening	¾ teaspoon baking powder
1 ¼ cup sugar	¾ teaspoon salt
1 ¼ cup brown sugar	2 ½ cups quick oats
3 eggs	2 ½ cups corn flakes
1 ½ teaspoons vanilla	1 ¾ cups coconut
2 ½ cups flour	1 ¾ cups chocolate chips



Preheat oven to 325°. Cream butter and shortening; add sugars and mix well. Add eggs and vanilla and mix well. In another bowl, mix flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Add flour mixture to butter mixture, a little at a time, until just mixed. Add quick oats, corn flakes, coconut and chocolate chips. Mix until just combined.

Drop by large tablespoon onto parchment-lined cookie sheet. Bake for about 13 minutes, checking periodically.

NOTE: Cindy Wheeler is our Head of Housekeeping, and this is her absolute favorite Menucha cookie. If she had her way, however, the recipe would contain three times as many chocolate chips!

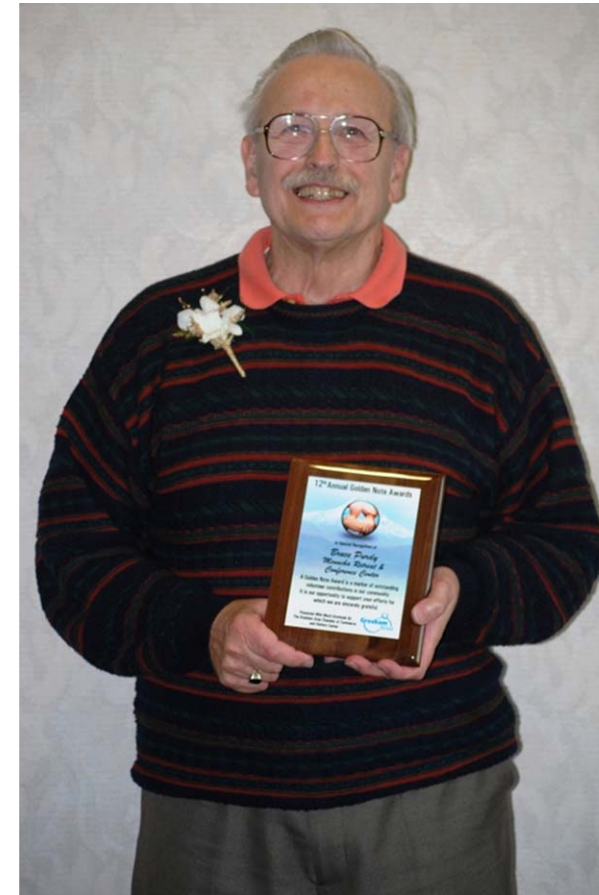

EASTER SUNRISE SERVICE AT MENUCHA Sunday, April 4th 6:30 a.m.

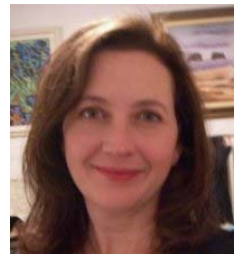

CELEBRATING 60 YEARS: FROM THE ARCHIVES

Samuel Lancaster, engineer of the Columbia River Highway, wrote some years ago:

"God shaped these great mountains round about us, and lifted up those mighty domes into a region of perpetual snow. He fashioned the Gorge of the Columbia, fixed the course of the broad river, and caused the crystal streams both small and great to leap down from the crags and sing their never-ending songs of joy...The Columbia River is peerless. Its grandeur speaks to men, and tells of Him who gathered the waters together in one place, and lifted up the mountains."



Mr. Lancaster perhaps did not realize in 1916, when he was asked by the later Governor Julius L. Meier to choose a site for an estate affording the best location and most spectacular view on the South rim of the Columbia Gorge, that his choice would ultimately become a place of recreation and retreat, of Christian fellowship and worship, of study and conference, for thousands of people in this Northwest area.

Dr. Paul S. Wright and Mr. Donald Leonard first viewed the Meier property on January 6, 1950, and on March 10, the official family of First Presbyterian Church unanimously voted to take option to purchase the property. The option papers were signed on April 14, and the deeds were recorded on June 30.

The real estate brochure that was distributed portrayed Menucha as a place of rest, of peace, of quiet and of great beauty. The asking price was \$200,000 unfurnished, or major improvements and 55.31 acres for \$100,000. The church purchased Menucha for \$60,000. Included in the brochure was the following description:

"This superbly developed property, undoubtedly one of America's most beautiful estates, was created by the late Julius L. Meier who, while serving as Governor of Oregon, made it his official residence. Up to the present time "Menucha" has remained in the Meier family. Located on U.S. Highway 30, two miles east of Corbett and 22 miles east of Portland, overlooking the Columbia River, magnificent views extend 30 miles to the East up the famous Columbia River Gorge and 30 miles West down the Scenic Valley. There are 167 acres mostly in its natural beauty rising to 800 ft. above the river. All of the land, except the grounds surrounding the residence, lies forested with mixed deciduous and evergreen trees, including cedars, maples and dogwoods. A back ground of mountain scenery stretching into the far horizon accents the picturesque woodland. The five acres of handsome landscaping that fan out about the house have been skillfully arranged to encompass wide sweeps of well-groomed lawns shaded by lovely white birch, pine and other fine old trees, rare specimen shrubbery and two orchards. A formal rose garden is planted with Golden Emblem, Seniors, Pernet and many other of the finest species in existence. Further brightening the scene are cutting gardens, vegetable gardens, lily and goldfish ponds. Approximately five miles of hard-surfaced private roads run throughout the property. The finest materials and workmanship were employed in the construction of the buildings which were planned for convenience and permanence. Much thought and care were given to the landscaping which resulted in a setting of dramatic beauty and grandeur."

The First Presbyterian Church newsletter, *The Spire*, further described the property in the April 21, 1950 issue:

"The formal developments are reached by a winding private entrance road, and consist of seven buildings with a wide lawn and magnificent view both up and down the Columbia and across into the hills of Washington. The main house, built in 1928 and unoccupied since 1941, is built in a rustic manner, befitting the environment, and contains eighteen rooms, with ample cooking, dining and living accommodations. There is an eight room guest house with ample dormitory space. The caretaker's cottage has a greenhouse adjacent, while another building near it contains more dormitory rooms, the laundry, and garage. Down a sloping lawn from the main house is the swimming pool, located on the rim of the promontory overlooking Crown Point. Other buildings include a barn and kennels. Construction of the buildings alone originally cost over a quarter of a million dollars, and they are worth far more than that today."
