MARINERS IN MISSION: Dedicated, Caring and Enthusiastic Volunteers



One definition of a volunteer is "someone who serves in a community primarily because they choose to do so." What an appropriate description of Mariners in Mission (MIMs). MIMs are retired Presbyterians who organize 2-4 work weeks each year at Presbyterian Camps, and Menucha was a grateful recipient of their time and talent for a week in April. The persistent rain could not dampen the enthusiasm of these dedicated, energetic volunteers who worked an amazing 413½ hours on:



- **THE BARN:** Removed and rebuilt handicap approach ramp
- **GARDENING:** Removed many bags and tarps full of garlic mustard, fern clippings and other leaves and debris; cleaned five pools in the rockery (most of which was done in the rain), planted and mulched 6 new apple trees, raked trails and collected limbs
- **THE HABITAT:** Removed old flooring and installed new floor tile, cove and baseboard; refitted doors, repainted bathrooms and showers, and reinstalled toilets
- **FURNITURE:** Repaired 8 chairs, and cleaned all the chairs in Wright Hall
- **OFFICE:** Filled out group readiness sheets and organized 3 years of back files. Thanks to Hazel for donating an electric stapler for the office—we love it!
- **BALLARD HALL:** Installed new tile in entryway
- **MAINTENANCE SHOP:** Made 10 signs, cut and assembled 14 bedrails, painted 2 large trellises, and sorted lumber
- **GIFT SHOP:** Organized inventory and put out new stock of shirts

THANK YOU TO OUR VOLUNTEERS—YOU'RE PART OF THE FAMILY!

In this edition of our newsletter, we have highlighted a number of volunteers who have recently visited us. Ramps have been built, trails maintained, new floors laid, new signs made and installed; the list of accomplishments is lengthy. Our volunteers have logged well over 1200 hours at Menucha for this year alone. To put that into some sort of perspective, a person working full time would have only worked 880 hours in that same period. That is a huge savings for us, but to say that our volunteer's work just saves us a bit of coin vastly undervalues their contribution. There is an economic side to be sure. They free up time for paid staff to be more productive. They help us complete tasks when we are under the gun. They do indeed save us a great deal of money by helping out. But they provide so much more.



First, let me say that we understand the sacredness of time. It is a priceless gift from God that is to be used wisely and that, once used, can never be used again. We also understand that people have a choice in how to use their time and what kind of thought goes into making that choice. Therefore we understand the kind of gift people give when they volunteer here. 

THE COOKTOP—A favorite recipe from the Menucha Kitchen

TOMATO-CUCUMBER SALAD — serves 6

Simple and refreshing, great for a summer picnic


2 cups chopped tomatoes	¼ cup olive oil
2 cups chopped cucumbers (see note)	1 teaspoon minced garlic
¼ cup chopped red onion	¼ cup red wine vinegar
1 teaspoon salt	1 teaspoon basil
1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley	Lettuce leaves



Mix tomatoes, cucumbers, red onion and salt; place in a colander. Drain for 30 minutes. Transfer to a bowl and add parsley.

Combine olive oil, garlic, vinegar and basil. Mix by hand or with blender. Pour over the salad and let chill for at least 1 hour. Salad can be chilled overnight, but does need to be stirred a couple of times before serving. Serve on a bed of lettuce leaves.

NOTE: English cucumbers do not need to be seeded and can be peeled in strips. Regular cucumbers need to be seeded and peeled.

GoodSearch

SURF THE WEB AND HELP MENUCHA

What if you could support Menucha just by doing something you probably already do every day? We've found a unique way for anyone with a computer to donate money to Menucha each time they conduct a simple Web search.

GoodSearch, a search engine powered by Yahoo, will donate \$0.01 to Menucha for each search performed. The money GoodSearch donates comes from its advertisers, so it doesn't cost the users or the organizations anything. A penny per search doesn't sound like much. However, if 250 supporters pledge to raise money for Menucha, and each searches the web five times a day, that adds up to \$4500 a year!

THE BATTLE AGAINST THE INVASIVE GARLIC MUSTARD

Garlic Mustard is an invasive species that is endangering our community and potentially the Columbia River Gorge as a whole. East Multnomah County has one of the highest concentrations of the plant in the state, and according to a map put out by the East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District, Corbett has the highest concentration of the infestation.

We at Menucha have noticed its spread over the last several years. It started taking over pockets of our lovely grounds and completely killing off the native flowers and forbs we cherish. Garlic Mustard does this by emitting a chemical from its roots that is poisonous to all other plants around it, killing them off and thus providing more room for itself in subsequent years. Each plant produces hundreds of seeds a year.

We have responded in a number of ways. This spring Menucha received a \$1000 grant from the East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District to help us begin controlling the weed. We have worked with them and Industrial Weed Control to map the extent of it on our grounds, and have used an herbicide to spray out the monocultures. In addition, many volunteers have come to hand-pull more sensitive areas where we could not spray, or where there were too many other species that could be affected by the herbicide.



We will seek additional grants for continuation of this challenge, as seed can lay dormant for up to five years in the soil. We have many years of plants that have seeded into our woodlands and watershed areas. So far, it has not reached the base of the canyon trail and Chanticleer Creek, for which we are thankful, but it is poised to drop seed down that watershed if we don't act quickly and decisively to stop it.

Thank you to all the volunteers who have helped to weed it. Keep coming — there is more work to do!

THANK YOU to the East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District, and especially to Julie DiLeone and Eann Rain. We are grateful for all their help, and for the \$1000 grant the EMSWCD awarded to Menucha. The monies were given specifically for garlic mustard removal, and were spent (with thanks to Lee from Industrial Weed Control) for labor and supplies for spraying. A special thanks to Julie for coming to Menucha and mapping the spread of garlic on our property.

HOW CAN YOU HELP? Walk your entire property and look for garlic mustard. The best identifying feature is the garlic odor of crushed leaves. If you know you have garlic mustard on your property, act now. If you find plants that you suspect to be garlic mustard, contact EMSWCD at 503-222-7645 x105. They can help with identification and provide technical assistance with control methods. Help us spread the word by sharing this information with your friends and neighbors. Don't let garlic mustard spread in Oregon!
